Sundays in Chapel 6 pm: Choral Evensong **Twonder**

1st week ★ 12 October *Wonder*

The Chaplain welcomes Freshers and reflects on how attentiveness to wonder nurtures and sustains well-being in body, mind and soul. Followed by dinner in Hall for all who attend Evensong (sign-up link in 0th-Week Chapel Mailing).

2nd week 19 October Finding Beauty behind Bars: reflections of a climate activist

Over the six weeks he spent in prison for climate activism and non-violent protest, **The Revd Tim Hewes** was graced with unexpected moments of wonder, beauty and humanity. His writing and advocacy on the looming environmental catastrophe we face challenge each of us to realise our own potential to act on behalf of humanity and the natural world.

3rd week ★ 26 October Stars of Wonder: reflections of a physicist

Wadham Professorial Fellow and Dr Lee's Professor of Experimental Philosophy **Prof. Paolo Radaelli** reflects on poetic and scientific pathways of wonder, in search of truth. Can the conviction that light obeys Maxwell's equations be held together with the assurance of Biblical faith that at Creation 'the light obeyed [God] in fear' (Baruch 3:33)?

4th week 2 November Light on Darkness: wonder and ritual

The research of **Dr Cosima Gillhammer** (LMH) on the synergies between Latin and medieval English religious culture elucidates the profound influence of Christian liturgy on Western European art, literature, music and architecture, and the enduring significance of the Liturgy as an expression of human emotion and religious experience.

5th week * 9 November A Way through the Darkness: the wonder and solace of poetry in war

'Sometimes poetry can serve as a vaccination against despair' (Lindsay Hilsum). The attentive observation by soldier-poets of the Great War recorded indelible images of war's horror and pity, but also afforded consolations that enabled endurance. **The Chaplain** considers poetry's function in war zones, from the Somme in 1918 to modern-day Gaza and Ukraine.

6th week 16 November The Wonder of Words (and everything else)

The poetry of spiritual director **Gillian Fenner**, aka 'The Pilgrim Poet', observes and celebrates wonder. Consonant with the Ignatian principle of finding God in all things, she will invite us to open our senses to the wonder all around, and connect with the Divine in the day to day with poetry as the pathway.

7th week ★ 23 November Queer Ways of Wonder

Priest, theologian, broadcaster, musician and medievalist, **The Revd Molly Boot** is currently based in rural Gloucestershire, but no stranger to Oxford (Regent's Park and St Hugh's). They're very enthusiastic about a lot of things, including music, prayer, LGBTQ+ liberation, and the stranger corners of medieval church history.

8th week 30 November College Carol Service followed by mulled wine and mince pies in Hall

Doors open at 5.30 pm for this first-come, first-seated College tradition of Candlelight Lessons and Carols, featuring our Chapel Choir and readers from the College community, as we ponder the Christmas story through stories ancient and modern.
